There is an underlying assumption in the Psalm which is that we were born into a spiritual _____ between good and evil.

David and the other writers of the psalms are writing from the middle of battle. It's a letter from the front lines of war.

How do we keep our hearts healthy in the midst of battling against evil?

3 truths to focus on:

1. In the big picture, God _______.

Fret not yourself because of evildoers; be not envious of wrongdoers!

For they will soon fade like the grass and wither like the green herb.

Psalm 37:1-2

Truly you set them in slippery places; you make them fall to ruin...
Psalm 73:18

2. Seek to be with God in the _____ of the battle.

This is also what we saw in Psalm 23. It's counter-intuitive but it's a big secret to success in life.

But for me it is good to be near God; I have made the Lord GoD my refuge, that I may tell of all your works Psalm 73:28

Delight yourself in the LORD, and he will give you the desires of your heart. Psalm 37:4

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3. You do your, Let God do God's.
It sounds easy enough but one of the most frequent sources of in life is when we try to carry a load that is meant for God
Be still before the LORD and wait patiently for him; fret not yourself over the one who prospers in his way, over the man who carries out evil devices! Psalm 37:7
One thing the Psalm needs to clarify apparently; is not your job.
Fretting means you are actuallyto do God's job.
When you try to do God's part, it puts you in a bad place and you won't be effective. Refrain from anger, and forsake wrath! Fret not yourself; it tends only to evil. Psalm 37:8
it all out is not your job either But when I thought how to understand this, it seemed to me a wearisome task, Psalm 73:16

Responding to God...

What fruit is produced when you try to figure out life's challenges without "going into the sanctuary? (73:17)" Can you find freedom in knowing you aren't supposed to understand it all on your own?
